
WHEREAS, the 1st Nations of America recognized these contributions and held the beloved woman in honor and respect; and


WHEREAS, in the United States this same respect and honor has been long in coming with the beloved woman being given full citizenship in the 1920's and full equality in the 1970's; and


WHEREAS, respect and honor for the beloved woman is the basis of respect and honor for the family, the children and the earth; now therefore




**Honors the Beloved Woman

for our families our neighbors our City and our Nation.**




